

## **RECTOR'S RAMBLINGS – CELTIC SPIRITUALITY**

The Celtic and Gaelic tradition of spirituality has remained largely unnoticed or ignored by the mainstream Christian churches for centuries. Then as the Education Act of 1872 began to mark the end of the Gaelic oral tradition in Scotland, **Alexander Carmichael**, a Scottish author with interest in folklore and legend, spent some 50 years on his **Gaelic Pilgrimages**. During this time, he travelled widely around the Isles of the Outer Hebrides collecting prayers and reflections from those Gaelic speaking peoples who farmed, fished and lived in these remote Outer Isles of Scotland.

His work, **Carmina Gadelica** was published in 1900 and is a rich compendium of prayers which were said in the homes.

They focused on our relationship with nature and the elements, wind and rain, water and soil, and light and darkness. They were characterised by the idea of community, and in this tradition the idea of the Trinity was central. This is idea of the unity of three persons in One, and it echoed in their language and poetry. God lives around us, in all the things of Creation, above and beneath us, at our side as well as inside our inner being. It is about being at one with the world around us.

Each day would begin with a prayer when the hearth fire was first lit or kindled and blessed as the source of life, of warmth and hot food, and ended with a prayer as it was raked through at the end of the day and prayers were asked for God's protection in the hours of darkness. Each aspect of life, seen as a part of a journey with God, and was the subject of a prayer.

Interest in Celtic spirituality reemerged towards the latter of half of the twentieth century. In recent years, largely through the work and writings of Canon Pat Robson of our Diocese here in Truro, there has been attempt to reignite the flame of the Cornish Celtic tradition. Celtic spirituality, has its focus is on the *sky that touches the land, the sea that touches the shore and the heaven that touches the earth*, (Martin Wallace), and now fit snuggly with our concern for the environment and anxiety over global warming, and with our growing appreciate of the world and the place in which we live and call home.


