#### **RECTOR'S RAMBLINGS – REMEMBRANCE AND HOPE**

November is the season of reflection as we move into the season of Remembrance. On All Soul's Day, Thursday 2<sup>nd</sup> November, there will be an opportunity to remember all those who have died and whose memory we cherish. At our Eucharist at 19.00 in St Neot Church names will be read out as part of our act of Remembrance. If you wish us to remember any loved ones, please let me have their names. Each act of remembrance is an important step on the path of grieving and helps us to process the feels death and loss cause.

On Armistice Day we will again hold a short service and silence on Armistice Day, Saturday 11th November, at 10.50 in Warleggan Church. Whilst on Remembrance Sunday, there will be an Act of Remembrance at 14.30 at the War Memorial in Mount when we read out the names of those from the village that died in the First and Second World Wars

As I write tension is mounting in the Middle East, and the uneasy peace between Israel and the peoples of Palestine, remind us never to forget the cost of war, from those in military service to civilians caught up in warfare. In the past soldiers were the main casualties of war, but today it is the elderly, women and children. And in this conflict we should be mindful of the dangers of escalation into something bigger. As the psalmist writes:

O Pray for the peace of Jerusalem: 'May they prosper who love you.

Peace be within your walls, and security within your towers.'

For the sake of my relatives and friends I will say, 'Peace be within you.' (Psalm 122 6-8)

From Remembrance we move onto the season of Advent and Hope. Something we badly need in our fractured world.

During the season of Advent in December, we have two special Christmas Services in Warleggan. There will be our traditional candle lit Carol Service at 18.00 on Christmas Eve, and this year on Sunday 10 December we will be holding our first Christingle Service at 15.00.

Christingle services focusing on teaching the message of Christmas to children and appeal particularly to those of preschool and primary school age, as well of course as the older members of their families! The central focus of the service is the Christingle, an orange symbolising the world, sweets attached to it reminding us of the harvest, a red ribbon to remind us of Jesus bringing healing, and the candle that Jesus is a light a dark world. We hope you will bring along young members of your family who might enjoy this service.

#### NATURE NOTES FROM LYNDA ...

Well I hope everyone is enjoying what is probably the last few dry days of autumn. I have been enjoying watching nature on our river. Although the river that stretches the length of the parish, and forms most of the eastern boundary, is sometimes called the Warleggan River, I much prefer the name Bedalder which is said to mean 'sweet water'. It is a small river, barely 7 kilometres long and it drops 200 metres before it joins the Fowey. In many places it is a secret river only seen by privileged landowners. It rises near Hawks Tor and is a typical moorland river until it passes Carburrow Tor where it becomes a boulder strewn river rushing between woodland. The only place where you can walk beside it is for a short stretch below Pantersbridge near the weir.

Because it is such a hidden river it is quiet and wild life can go about their daily search for food. Otters very occasionally go exploring up the river and also occasionally, an escaped beaver has gone downstream. Deer, fox and badger regularly cross it and drink from the water and herons wade along in the shallows.

#### TIM STEPHENSON OF WOODA CLOSES HIS LAST CASE

At the end of April we were in Warleggan for several brilliant but as ever very busy days until a late return to Hampshire on a Sunday evening, and my very last case formally settled at 9 am on the previous Saturday morning, after many tense conversations with the opposing side while (little did they know) I was contentedly seated in Wooda's dairy. There were still some admin matters, but these dwindled with each day and the very last thing is now sorted, so the whole case is done and will no more obtrude itself at wholly awkward times and for days, and sometimes weeks, on end, and I will never again take that particular laptop to Cornwall - in fact I will return it to an address in London EC3 next week. It is the end of a long era, some 35+ years in the business, and with an unexpected bookending coincidence: I started my legal career in New Bridge Street, London EC4 on a Monday morning, and in practical terms ended it in New Bridge Street, Truro on a Friday evening.

At just over three years and one month that final case was one of the longestrunning matters that I ever handled, and certainly in many ways one of the most challenging. It is a very good feeling to have left private practice, in order to continue as a freelance content-writer - much of that still happily in shipping - and also (though I know what I am up against) hopefully someday start a new line as a novelist. We shall see.

#### **NATURE NOTES** .. Continued

In summer kingfishers and dippers can be seen, and swallows flit amongst the cattle that drink its waters. The river is a beautiful place and you are lucky if you get the chance to just sit and 'river watch'.

This golden autumn should be good news for the wildlife, allowing animals such as bats, hedgehogs and dormice plenty of opportunity to feast and fatten up before their hibernation. There are masses of berries on the trees, traditionally a sign of a hard winter to come.

The hedgehog news from Warleggan is good with some active hogs about, but sadly a motorist drove up Chapel Lane without any consideration for wildlife and killed one of the hedgehogs. I'm afraid news from Mount is not so good as I do not have any definite reports of hogs about. We had a possible poo but nothing else so this may rate as the first year I have never had a hog in the garden – very sad.

I have also not had much luck with dormice, although as ever, I suspect they are about in limited numbers. Our posh dormice boxes, although erected in all the places I had filmed dormice, only appealed to a healthy selection of woodlice, earwigs and slugs. I did try filming in a new area adjacent to the existing area but no joy, wood mice and shrews, owls and jays and of course lots of squirrels. Squirrels totally ruined one bird box and major modifications are needed to another they attacked, so my least favourite rodent at present.

There have been some shrew sighting reported, several due to some kittens learning to hunt. Shrews, due to their high metabolic rate do not hibernate, so keep the reports coming, we have yet to see a pygmy or water shrew this year. **Lynda**




